Sweet Revenge

Indians scalp Cowboys

The stands for both sides were packed with hopeful alumni, parents and students when New Trier East met New Trier West in Saturday's season opener. Everyone was hoping the cool damp chill of the day would fade. For East it did. For West rain couldn't've fallen sooner.

East handed the Pokes a stunning 28-0 blow in the pair's second meeting and turned the table on the team that defeated the Indians 21-0 last year.

Moments of brilliant execution for both teams didn't flourish. In fact, both teams made lots of mistakes. But as the score proves, West's mistakes were devastating while East came through with the right move at the right time.

TWICE IN THE first quarter East took advantage of West's mistakes to go ahead by 14. It was a lead that changed West's game plan and gave East a buffer with which to experiment.

When the Pokes couldn't move the ball following the opening kickoff, Dennis Wellington was forced to punt. Indian Clay Matthews blocked the attempt at about midfield and East guard Dan Goodman picked up the loose ball and ran to West's 38.

Eight plays later with 4:58 showing on the clock, East's Jeff Nadherny dove one yard for the first TD of the game.

WEST CAME BACK with a good drive, starting at its own 32 yard line, but Poke

Jeff Lobelson fumbled on East's 37. Indian Brad Fox picked up the ball and galloped 58 yards for the second TD with about one minute left in the first period.

The Indians continued their assault when, midway through the second quarter, West was forced to punt again. A 15 yard penalty for piling on put East on its own 46. With third and 17 to go, Indian Dave Harvey called a quarterback draw, saw daylight and raced 53 yards for a touchdown.

The final score came on a six-play drive after the second half kick-off when Harvey ran 51 yards on a quarterback option.

Tim Hall's kicks were good on all four attempts.

"WE JUST WEREN'T executing well at all," says West coach Bob Naughton. "I felt terrible (about losing) from the standpoint that they (the Pokes) looked like they didn't know what they were doing."

"We broke down in three places," he lamented after the stinging loss. Those three breakdowns were the chief causes of the first three Indian TDs, according to the veteran coach.

Naughton wasn't the only one talking about mistakes that needed correcting. East's Chic Cichowski also noted areas that needed work.

"OUR TACKLING NEEDS some work," Cichowski says. "And our downfield blocking really needs work."

But Cichowski wasn't complaining one bit about his team's Saturday performance.

"The kids were mentally high for this game, and they didn't want to lose to West this year like they did last," he says. "The guys were hitting well and hustling. I think we were just higher than they were."

Naughton would agree with that remark. "We looked really sharp a couple weeks ago," he says, "but since then, we've been very dull. We were very flat."

"PART OF OUR ATTITUDE may have been due to the time lapse," Naughton

says. "We worked so hard, and then having to sit around and wait for that first game..."

"Oh, well, it's just one game in eight," says the optimistic mentor. "But it still hurts."

West's game plan had to change after the Indians scored their second TD. And that's when things started falling apart for the Pokes.

"That's when we looked very bad," Naughton says. "We were behind and had to play grab bag ball—go for the passes and play more aggressively."

While the Pokes were struggling, the Indians were reading the defenses well throughout the game. "We figured out the linebackers," Cichowski said. "They were blitzing really often," he explained.

Harvey lead East's rushing game with 102 yards and "I was very pleased with him," Cichowski says. "He read them well, faked well... besides his top rushing mark."

"West has a good club," Cichowski says, "and should do well this season."

NAUGHTON HOPES HIS team will come up to that expectation, but knows the schedule isn't going to get easier. Saturday the Pokes play Proviso East and "they always have a good, big team," the coach says. "It could be an interesting game," he says. "They have a new coach (Joe Krupa) who's been waiting for a long time to get a head job and I have a lot of respect for him. They should have a good club."

New Trier East faces Maine North at home Saturday and although the Norsemen have yet to see a winning season Cichowski isn't thinking they'll be a real snap to beat.

"We should win without too many problems," he says, "but when we scouted them we noticed that they looked really hard-nosed. They've got a good quarterback and it looks like they have good talent. They just couldn't get it together against Rolling Meadows (Maine North lost that game 16-8)."

ONE FACTOR THAT could have an impact on the outcome of the Maine North game is the sidelining of last week's leading tackle.

Clay Matthews, the California transfer student who is one of East's top players, will be out of action for a couple weeks due to a broken hand.

Matthews' hand, now in a cast, was broken in the first half of the New Trier match. "He played the whole second half with it that way," Cichowski says, "and probably played a better game than in the first half. He's the first real football player we've ever had at East."

THEN THERE was New Trier East, defending Suburban League champions, who pummeled cross-township rival New Trier West 28-0. Or

New Trier East, the team that dethroned Evanston as Suburban League champion last season, had little trouble with New Trier West as Quarterback Dave Harvey scored on runs of 53 and 51 yards to pace the attack. Dan McNertney and Brad Fox also tallied for East, Fox's run coming as the result of a 58-yard run with a recovered fumble.

Indians dump Maine 28-0

Although New Trier East's football team currently is ranked No. 2 in the area, the Indians didn't dominate the Maine North Norsemen in Saturday's game even though the final outcome was a 28-0 loss for the visitors.

"We looked flat all the way around," says Indian coach Chic Cichowski. "We made both physical and mental mistakes."

All in all, Cichowski wasn't pleased with his team's efforts, in spite of the score.

"WE WERE LINING up offenses, had too many missed assignments, guys were blocking the wrong way . . . we've got to improve in order to keep playing with everyone else."

And the veteran coach felt the players' physical conditioning could have been better. "We were too tired for what we had done," he says.

Norsemen coach Lou Gartner wasn't disappointed in his team's performance, only the final outcome.

"This is the first group of seniors who have gone through Maine North's system since the school opened four years ago. And this group puts out 110 per cent effort, and plays well as a unit," he says.

"OFFENSIVELY, OUR backs ran as hard as any backs I've seen in any high school game. And our offensive line was opening up some holes."

But the holes weren't wide enough and didn't come often enough to give the Norsemen a chance on the scoreboard. In fact they never got beyond mid-field on an offensive drive.

Instead they gave the Indians a hard time in-between their touchdowns. For example:

- New Trier East got to Maine North's five-yard line following a 64-yard kickoff return by Chico Dennison. The Indians went for the fourth and one. But Bob Andropolis and Mike Schumacher came through to hold East on the five.

- The same situation (fourth and one to go) occurred later in the first and fourth quarters. Both times Maine North held the Indians.

New Trier's first touchdown came with 3:32 left in the first half. That drive started with a 26 yard punt return by Tim Clark. It highlighted by a magnificent one-handed catch on a pass from quarterback Dave Harvey to Jeff Naderhny. Clark sprinted three-yards for the TD and Tim Hall's kick was good, making the halftime score 7-0.

WHEN MAINE NORTH fumbled a punt return on New Trier's nine in the third quarter, the Indians overcame a 15-yard clipping penalty and drove in from the 24-yard line for the second TD. Clark ran around the Norsemen's left end for the goal and Hall got the extra point.

New Trier took possession of the ball on its own 16 at the beginning of the fourth period. Dave Hall ran a 16-yard reverse sweep around the right end, making the score 20-0 at 7:49 left in the game. Tim Hall again kicked the extra point.

With about two minutes left in the game, Dave Hall ran the same play around the left end for the final TD. The kick was good . . . making the final score 28-0.

ANDY BINDER WAS one of East's top rushers—gaining over 100 yards for the Indians (most of which were gained in the second half).

Harvey and Binder were voted top Indian offensive backs of the week while John Oberlin took offensive lineman honors. Ron Gion was top defensive lineman while Clark was named top defensive back.

Clay Matthews is still sidelined with a broken hand and is not expected to return to action for Saturday's game against Niles East.

"I REALLY don't know how we'll do," says Cichowski. "It's really hard to tell. Niles East is a lot bigger than we are. They have guards and tackles who weigh between 230 and 240. But they've lost their first two games."

Maine North meets Maine East at East's homecoming Saturday. And that poses a big problem for the Norsemen.

"We're worried," says Gartner. "After seeing the size of Maine East . . . well, like I say, we're worried."

"WE'RE QUICK, BUT whether we can give up between 30 and 40 pounds on the line and still do well . . ."

Besides being undersized for their opponents, Maine North will most likely be understaffed too, which won't help the 35-man team.

For the loss (due to injuries) of Dave Helton, senior quarterback in the opener against Rolling Meadows, and starters Andropolis and Vito Cristino in Saturday's game against New Trier will pull deep into the reserve squads.

But, then again, Maine North could surprise their opponents. "For four years now we've been scaring a lot of teams," says Gartner.

And for the first time in the school's history, Gartner is playing a team he's trained for four years. Sooner or later, the team is going to start doing more than just scare its opponents—and win a game.

Sizzling Indians tame Mustangs

Morton East was supposed to be a tough opponent for New Trier East, but apparently nobody told the Indians, as they nonchalantly rolled to a 43-0 whitewash of Morton on Friday afternoon.

The Indians, variously rated at or near the top in polls of Chicago area high school football teams, have not been scored upon yet in four contests so far this season. They have wracked their opponents for a total of 133 points.

Morton East's record now is a rather dismal-appearing 0-4, but it must be said that in this case appearances are deceiving. The Mustangs have faced powerful opposition in all four games and the week prior to their rout at the hands of the Indians they lost a heartbreaker to Niles North, 8-6, despite a well-played ball game.

"We're disappointed," admits Morton coach Ken Geiger. "We played a hell of a game last week. We were just flat here today."

GEIGER IS LAVISH in his praise of New Trier East, calling them "probably the most well-balanced team we've played. They run well to every hole. They're well-coached, well-disciplined, and they do everything well-run, pass, punt, block..."

No doubt about it. The Indians did just about everything well on Friday. They scored the very first time they got their hands on the ball, driving 56 yards to paydirt in just eight plays—and it was all uphill from there.

Tim Clark returned the opening kickoff 24 yards to the 46, and then quarterback Dave Harvey took charge. Harvey mixed up the plays well, handing off to a different back each time, completed an 18-yard pass to Charles Denison, and carried the ball over the final 17 yards himself with a sweep to the left. The Mustangs were knocked off balance by the dazzling display of versatility, and never did regain their equilibrium.

New Trier scored twice in each of the first two periods to take a 29-0 lead into halftime.

LATE IN THE first quarter Denison broke through the Mustang line at the 13 and was stopped just short of the goal line. Tim Clark carried the ball over and Tim Hall booted the extra point, a feat he was to accomplish five times in the game in as many tries.

Moments later, following a futile effort by Morton to gain ground, Denison took the punt on the Indian's 35 and galloped the 65 yards to the end zone unscathed. The Indians picked up two extra points when Harvey, holding for Hall on the kick attempt, fumbled the center snap, picked up the ball and raced down the sideline, evading several surprised Mustang defenders.

Two plays later Mustang quarterback Ray Pace attempted a pass only to find New Trier's Tim Clark there ahead of his intended receiver. The ball bounced off Clark's chest into the hands of Denison, who returned it 20 yards to the Morton 44.

Once again the Indians were unstoppable, grinding out yardage like a well-oiled machine. Andy Binder picked up the final few inches necessary for the score.

ANOTHER INTERCEPTION on the first play of the second half set the stage for the fifth New Trier tally. Roger Castino picked off this one and ran it back to the Mustang 17 yard line. Binder broke through the center of the Mustang line on the next play and charged into the end zone.

The final score of the game came with 6:53 left in the third quarter. Harvey lofted

one of his patented long bombs and Dave Hall grabbed it on the dead run and raced unopposed into the end zone.

Morton was held to a gain of only 88 yards on the ground, most of it on a 75-yard run starting off the fourth quarter. The Mustangs came perilously close to marring the Indians' unblemished defensive record when a fine pass from Pace and several strong runs by tailback Ed Olecik brought them down to a first-and-goal on the eight yard line.

That's as far as they could get, however, as the Indian defense tightened up and stopped the Mustangs cold. Jim Hardee nailed Pace for a three-yard loss and Olecik was held to short gains on the next two plays. The Indians regained possession on their eight yard line and the Mustangs did not threaten again.

DESPITE THE lopsided score New Trier East coach Chic Cichowski is unhappy about what he calls "the little mistakes that can hurt you." For example, Dave Hall broke away for a 43-yard gain down to the Morton one-yard line, only to have the ball called back due to a holding penalty.

Another source of displeasure to Cichowski was losing the services of safety Roger Castino, who was kicked out of the game early in the fourth quarter along with a Morton East player when the two got into a skirmish over some impolite phrases.

"I still don't think we're playing up to our potential," says Cichowski. "We weren't as high mentally as we could have been. The thing we have to do is keep on improving, that's what I emphasize constantly to the players. We've improved a little in the last three games, but we still have to eliminate those little mistakes."

After viewing the game films, Cichowski and his staff picked Jack Oberlin and Tim Hall as the game's outstanding offensive linemen for their blocking and Dave Hall, offensive back, was honored for his double-teaming efforts, as well as his ball-carrying and two pass receptions.

TIM CLARK, who plays the "rover

back" position, was chosen the top defensive back, and Al Hurley, tackle, got the nod as defensive lineman. Clay Matthews got the "hit of the week" award for jarring the daylights out of a ball-carrier at the line of scrimmage, a play that was caught nicely on film.

Next Saturday the Indians travel to Waukegan, which was soundly thrashed by Oak Park this past weekend.

Easy 27-6 winner

NTE grid machine eats up Bulldogs

New Trier East played half a fantastic ball game—the first one on Saturday, spoiling Waukegan's Homecoming with a 27-6 pasting of the Bulldogs.

The second half? Well, suffice it to say that the Indians fell far below their usual standard of high-velocity offense and impenetrable defense.

The first half the Indians steam-rolled Waukegan, picking up six first downs en route to four touchdowns (three in the second quarter alone), rushing for 79 yards and picking up 79 more on three passes by quarterback Dave Harvey.

The Indian defense, meanwhile, used the old sledgehammer approach in holding the Bulldogs at bay. Waukegan was forced to fumble four times in the first half, and was unable to advance beyond its own 40 yard line. The Bulldog rushing attack totalled minus 18 yards for the half, while quarterback Dan Melmen could manage only one pass completion for ten yards.

THE SECOND half was a whole different ball game. For the first time in five games this season the Indians were held scoreless for an entire half. Worse yet, Waukegan's halfback Mike Kincaid broke through the middle of the Indian line in the third quarter and ran 55 yards for a touchdown, marking the first time this year that an enemy player has crossed New Trier's goal line.

"We played so well in the first half," says Indian coach Chic Cichowski, "that I think the kids figured Waukegan would just come out and die the second half. Instead they came out fired up. We were a little flat the second half; I was disappointed in their hustling and tackling."

New Trier's Chuck Denison recovered a Waukegan fumble early in the game to set up the first score. Andy Binder swept left end for 20 yards for the next play, and then carried the ball over the goal line from the four. Tim Hall booted the extra point—Hall was three for four in that category on Saturday—and the Indians led, 7-0.

On the first play of the second quarter Harvey hit Tim Hall who ran 43 yards down the sideline for the score. After that it was Dave Hall's turn, with a seven-yard touchdown run and another tally with only nine seconds remaining in the half on a screen pass from 13 yards out.

BINDER NOW leads the team in

rushing, followed by Tim Clark and Harvey. Clark and Dave Hall were named the game's outstanding offensive backs by the New Trier coaches.

Chosen the game's top offensive lineman was center Duff Stewart, who had the highest blocking percentage on the line. Roger Castino, defensive halfback, was the leading tackler in the game with 11. Castino also made the tackle on four kickoffs.

Mark Gion, tackle, and end Jim Hardee got the nod from the coaches for their defensive efforts on the line. Linebackers Tim Perry and Clay Matthews "also played good defensive ball games," according to Cichowski.

The Indians' offensive ends, Tim Hall and Jeff Nadherny, have been doing an excellent job of blocking and Cichowski credits them with much of the team's success. Nadherny is the leading downfield blocker.

Coach Cichowski's goal all season has been to improve with every game, and up to now the Indians have shown a tendency to do just that, winning by scores of 28-0 (twice), 34-0, then 43-0. In that light, then, Saturday's game has to be seen as something of a letdown.

NEVERTHELESS, the Indians showed in the first half what they are capable of doing, and this is just what they are going to need to do if they are to stay on top of the stiff competition that they face in the weeks ahead.

New Trier has three games remaining on the schedule, all conference rivals. Next week they travel to Proviso East, followed by a showdown Homecoming match with unbeaten Evanston, and they

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close out the season at Oak Park on Nov. 3.

"Proviso will probably be the toughest team we've faced to date this season," says Cichowski. "They're big, fast and well-coached. They are always a physical team and I think they're improving."

Proviso is coached this year by Joe Krupa, a former lineman for the Pitts-


burgh Steelers, and Krupa likes to run a pro-set offense with a split backfield and one or two wide receivers. At least, this is what Cichowski is anticipating and preparing his team for. The pro setup has been for the most part successful at Proviso, victors over Oak Park on Saturday 8-6.

EVANSTON, the No. 1 high school football team in last week's Prep Power Rankings, routed Morton East 43-0, while Suburban League rival New Trier East made its record 5-0 with a 27-6 victory over Waukegan. Yet Waukegan did score, something that the first four New Trier foes had been unable to do.

Quarterback Dave Hoover scored two touchdowns for Evanston in the Wildkats' laughter. It was their fourth consecutive shutout. Dave Harvey threw two touchdown passes for New Trier East, to Tim Hall for 45 yards and Tim Clark for 15 yards. But Mike Kincaid of Waukegan ended the New Trier's string of goose eggs at 18 consecutive quarters with his 45-yard touchdown run in the third period.

Indians hurdle Proviso; Kits next

New Trier East scored two first-half touchdowns and put together two goal line stands in a 14-0 winning effort over the Pirates of Proviso East Saturday afternoon in Maywood.

In winning, the Indians remain undefeated with a Suburban League record of 3-0 and 6-0 overall which sets up the big show-down Saturday with the Evanston Wildkits.

"Proviso was a very important game for us," says New Trier coach Chic Cichowski. "We definitely felt that Proviso East would be our toughest game through the first six games of the season."

Although the offense put 14 points on the board, this game belonged to the defense, which has been strong all season allowing just six points.

WITHOUT A GREAT effort by the defense, the game very well could have

ended in a tie or maybe even a loss. Twice Proviso East came within one foot of the goal line only to be stopped by the charged-up Indian defensive line.

The first big effort came on the last series of the first half. Proviso East, down 14-0, put together a drive from its own 33-yard line down to the one-foot line. With the clock ticking off the final seconds of the half, New Trier East forced the Pirates to fumble the ball and shut off the Pirates scoring attempt.

Early in the third quarter, the Pirates recovered a fumble at their own 47 and began another drive which brought them down again to the one foot line.

This time it was sheer brute on the part of New Trier East that kept Proviso East off the scoreboard. Proviso East's big quarterback, Jack Karstens, attempted a sneak up the middle, but the New Trier East defense held its ground and for all purposes that was the ballgame.

THE NEW TRIER East offensive eleven

put together a pretty good ball game in its own right. It passed and ran for 212 total yards and managed to put two touchdowns on the scoreboard in the first half to add to an already hefty amount of 184 total season points.

Behind quarterback Dave Harvey, New Trier East scored the first time it had the ball. 

New Trier East beats Evanston in 3-0 thriller

"We were really up for this game—we couldn't have wanted it more," said a jubilant Dave Harvey, New Trier East quarterback, in the locker room following the Indians' 3-0 squeaker over Evanston on Saturday.

And Harvey's teammates all agreed. They had indeed been "hungry" for the victory—thus fulfilling NTE coach Chic Cichowski's pre-game prophesy that the team that would walk off the field with victory in hand would be the team that was hungrier.

Not that Evanston's Wildkits hadn't wanted the victory. They tried hard enough, but it just wasn't there, that extra something that you need to win the game that everyone knew would go down to the wire, that pitted a pair of unbeaten Suburban League rivals against each other in the championship bout.

Evanston could still conceivably manage a tie for first place in the suburban league, but only if the Indians lose their final game of the season at Oak Park next week, which isn't likely. And anyway, whatever happens, the finale could only be anticlimactic after the dramatic fashion in which the Indians pulled off the big coup on Saturday.

ALTHOUGH MOST polls of Chicago area teams have rated Evanston at the top among public schools all season, statistics and the opinions of coaches indicated that the two teams were just about even going into the big game. And that's the way it worked out on the field.

The first half was a standoff. Although both Evanston and New Trier boast potent offenses, it turned into a defensive battle with neither side able to make much

headway. It was as though the irresistible force had met the immovable object.

Evanston's potential all-state halfback, speedy Joe Stewart, was held to only one long gainer, a 48-yard sprint that went for nought when New Trier's Tim Clark intercepted a pass thrown by Dave Hoover, Wildkit signal-caller, two plays later. It was one of four interceptions picked off by Indian defenders in the game.

The New Trier offense was similarly smothered in the first half. Although the Indians managed four first downs (three of them picked up by fullback Clay Matthews), their farthest point of penetration was Evanston's 31-yard line. They got that far thanks mainly to a 44-yard pass play from Harvey to Dave Hall—the only pass that either side could complete on that afternoon of rain and mud.

THE BIG BREAK for New Trier came after Tim Hall had kicked off to start the second half. The ball was fumbled, and Tom Nissly recovered for the Indians deep in Wildkit territory.

Clay Matthews, Harvey, and Andy Binder combined their running talents to move the ball down to the Evanston eight yard line where, on fourth down, Cichowski faced a crucial decision.

The Indians were well within the field goal kicking range of Tim Hall, who is one of the team's leading scorers on the basis of his extra-point kicks. Any kind of score would have looked big at that point in the game.

Hall, however, had not attempted a field goal all season, nor had anyone else on the team. And to make matters worse, Hall had injured his kicking leg several plays earlier, and suffered possible torn ligaments in the knee.

Cichowski was going to go for the first down—they needed five yards—when Hall told the coach, "I think I can kick one."

"Well, one is all we needed," says Cichowski, so he sent in his ace kicker to do the job. The kick was good—just barely, though Hall put all the strength into it that his injured leg could muster—and the Indians had the lead.

HOLDING ON to the three-point lead was no simple task. Late in the third quarter Evanston initiated a drive that almost proved to be the undoing of the Indians.

At one point the Wildkits' Jim Ossyra took off down the sideline on a reverse play that had the Indians completely fooled. He broke into the open and it looked for all the world like he would go in for the touchdown when fleet-footed Brad Fox caught up with the ball-carrier and saved the game with a diving shoe string tackle on the 11-yard line.

That didn't end the Wildkits' threat, however. All it did was set the stage for one of the most controversial calls by an official in a high school game in many a year.

Evanston moved the ball down to New Trier's eight yard line and, on a fourth-and-seven situation, Evanston coach Murney Lazier decided to go for the tie. He sent in place-kicker Jim Skinner to attempt the field goal.

Skinner's kick was a thing of beauty, high and long and right through the uprights. But the officials did not raise their hands to indicate the score. Instead a flag went down, and several minutes of confusion ensued before it became clear that the kick was nullified and Evanston was being penalized 15 yards, putting them out of field goal range.

REFEREE JOE Pomponi had detected Skinner's mouthguard dangling from his helmet at the moment the ball was kicked, and the penalty was for improper use of

equipment.

Lazier was enraged. He spent several minutes on the field arguing the call, and after the game, even before the smoke had cleared, he was in the officials' dressing room protesting the action.

The protest was in vain, however, as there is apparently no recourse for appeal on such a call. "There's nothing we can do about it," said Lazier, immediately after the game. "We got screwed. It's a shame."

Still angry a couple of days later, Lazier added, "That fellow (Pomponi) has great eyes. He should be a forward artillery observer. It was wet, it was raining and he saw that through 22 people. I just don't see how he could call that."

Cichowski saw things a little differently. "I think God was on our side on that field goal call. The ref spotted the infraction and he had to call it. It might be a cheap rule but I'm glad it was in there this week."

"This is probably my biggest thrill ever," says Cichowski, who has seen a lot of football action in his day, having played himself for Indiana University and later the Pittsburgh Steelers and Washington Redskins.



Evanston gets 'kicked' by New Trier East 3-0

FOR THE WANT of a mouthguard a field goal was lost. For want of a field goal a game was decided. For want of a game a championship was gone.

And that's how New Trier East tripped Evanston 3-0 yesterday in a battle of unbeaten Suburban League giants. All for want of a mouthguard in place.

And that's how New Trier East, relying on its mighty defensive wall, gained at least a tie for the league title on a cold, wet, miserable afternoon. An official detected the mouthguard dangling from the helmet bars of a player he said was kicker Jim Skinner as Skinner apparently kicked a tying 26-yard field goal late in the third period.

Rules say a player must have his mouthguard in place during any action. And altho the enforcement is desultory at best, when the flag was thrown it meant a 15-yard penalty for the Wildcats and the realistic end of victory hopes.

Evanston wasn't the only unbeaten team to lose on a soggy afternoon. Lyons Township snapped Glenbard West's eight-game winning streak 22-14. Rich Central upended Evergreen Park 25-21, and Tinley Park won its 22d consecutive game, ripping previously unbeaten Oak Forest, 30-0.

But New Trier East coach "Chick" Chlcowski pointed to his masterful defense as

the key to the game. Evanston never made more than one first down any offensive series. The Indians intercepted four passes and recovered a vital fumble on the second half kickoff that set up the field goal.

TIM HALL, who may have suffered torn ligaments in his right (kicking) knee on that fumble recovery booted the three-pointer with 9:05 left in the third stanza. "He told me he thought he could kick at least one," said Chlcowski.

"I'm not taking anything away from Evanston, but on a dry field, I think we could have scored more with out passing game," Chlcowski said. "Of course [Joe] Stewart could have scored for them."

Stewart, Evanston's quickest back, got free once, picking up 48 yards to the Indians 31 in the second period but Tim Clark picked up one of his two interceptions three plays later to end the threat. Roger Castino and Charles Denison were the other pass stealers.

An end-around by Jim Osyrya, good for 51 yards, moved Evanston into range late in the third period and Skinner's kick was high, true and good until that official dropped the flag.

Evanston never really threatened after that. New Trier's defensive wall of Jim Hardee, Tim Hall, Alexander

Pitt, Mark Gion, and Allen Hurley swarmed all over Wildkit runners. They were aided by linebackers Clay Matthews and Dan Goodman, with Matthews doing double duty as a sturdy 215-pound running back.

THE INDIANS are now 7-0 and one game [against Oak Park] away from a clean sweep.

However Glenbard West has only a West Suburban Conference tie with Lyons to look forward to. The defending league champs were beaten by a strong LaGrange defense and an opportunistic offense that scored early and late.

Bill Saban's 2-yard run, Dave Pavelic's 85-yard scamper, in the first half, and Paul Douglas' 1-yard effort in the last period helped the Lions [6-2] to a 22-7 lead before Ray Ratke returned a kickoff 85 yards for Glenbard West's last score in the final stanza.

Dirk Schnittker scored his third touch-down in the last quarter to pace Rich Central [6-1] to its victory over Evergreen Park [8-1]. Schnittker's game-winning effort was from the 7. Evergreen Park's Ed Costin had scored all his team's points, on runs of 65, 67, and 1 yard.

Tinley Park had no trouble with Oak Forest, Curt Lubaty scoring on a 75-yard run, plus kicking three extra points and a 28-yard field goal. The victors are now 8-0 on the season, Oak Forest 6-1.

It's title weekend for preps

New Trier East vaults to 1st

THE MOUTHGUARD debate still rages in the North suburbs, but it won't change the result of New Trier East's 3-0 victory over Evanston Saturday.

That controversy came when an official claimed an Evanston player's mouthguard was not in place on a play in which the Wildkats kicked an apparent tying field goal late in the third period. That infraction cost Evanston 15 yards and a tie.

Because of that decision, plus a rash of upsets thruout the Chicago area that left only five high school teams in the unbeaten, untied ranks, New Trier East has vaulted into the top spot in this week's Prep Power Rankings.

BUT THE FIRST place Indians, eighth last week, are less than one-half of a point in front of Evanston, with Deerfield (7-0) and Wheaton North (8-0) next in line.

Then comes St. Rita, considered by "experts" the best of all the Chicagoland teams, but losers to Fenwick (33-14) last Sunday in the biggest upset of the season. Yet the fifth place Mustangs will probably advance back towards the top during the Catholic League playoffs.

Other previously unbeaten teams losing were Glenbard West [22-14 to LaGrange], Evergreen Park [25-21 to Rich Central], and Naperville [14-0 to Elgin Larkin]. In addition, Oak Forest, which was unbeaten but not in the top 25 last week, lost to Tinley Park 30-0.

HOWEVER, the debate over that mouthguard call

stirred interest and questions from coaches and officials thruout the area.

One Chicago Public League coach said that there was an unofficial agreement among some coaches before the start of the season not to enforce the mouthguard rule, which states that a player must wear that protective instrument in place during any action on the field.

"I think it's the damndest, silliest thing I've ever heard of," he said.

A respected high school and Big Ten official said that in the interest of safety that rule "has made a travesty of the game."

"THERE IS such a mouthguard rule in college," he continued. "But there is no penalty. The player is told to put it in place and if he doesn't he is asked to leave the game until he does."

"I would do it, and most officials I know would just tell the kid to get his mouthguard in place beforehand."

NTE crushes Oak Park 47-15 in season finale

"Bring on Ohio State."

That's what New Trier East loyalists were shouting after the Indians final contest of the season against Oak Park. The verdict was 47-15 in favor of East and it seems that all that remains of the 1973 Campaign is the formal installation of the Indians as the top team in the state. That will be left to the pollsters but East's unblemished Suburban League record speaks for itself.

The Indian war dance in Oak Park began on an ominous note as the home team's Joe Barrett gathered in Tim Hall's kick on his own 15-yard line, broke to his right and scampered 85 yards for the score. Barrett split the uprights for the PAT and suddenly the best team in the state found itself behind 7-0.

The Huskie lead didn't last for long though as the Indians mounted a drive on their own 40 which culminated in an eight yard scoring sweep by quarterback Dave Harvey. Along the way they picked up 34 yards on a run by Dave Hall and some tough mileage from running back Clay Matthews. The PAT boot was good and that was the last Oak Park saw of the lead.

MATTHEWS MADE HIS name known again during the Indians second possession by driving off tackle 53 yards to paydirt. It was one of the few times all afternoon that New Trier had to begin their labor from beyond the 50 yard line. But the good field position they commanded throughout the contest hardly mattered since the Indians clearly dominated the line of scrimmage wherever the action took place.

"They did just about everything well," was losing coach Ed Zemba's comment. "They played tough defense. They ran hard. And their passing attack just ate us up."

New Trier established their hard running early. They built up a 21-7 margin on the merits of a one yard plunge by Bill Dunton in the waning moments of the opening stanza. Then the Indians resorted to a bit of trickery and negotiated a fake field goal attempt into a 25 yard scoring pass from Harvey to end Jeff Nadherny. The Huskies garnered some respect after that score by blocking the extra point attempt, but by then the tally was 27-7 in favor of the Indians and there was little more than respect for the home squad to play for.

The Huskies didn't do too badly in the respect category as the second half began. In the third period they ran 19 plays to East's seven and held the Indian rushing total to eight yards for the quarter. They didn't however put the clamps on Dave Harvey. Ed Zemba calls him very simply "the best quarterback we've seen this year, just a devastating passer."

HARVEY PUT ANOTHER six points on the board with a scoring aerial to Chuck Denison from 62 yards away. That was after Dave Hall lugged the second half kick-off 84 yards for a touchdown. It was plays of that proportion that led Oak Park athletic director Jim Perkins to remark, "New Trier is a very, very fine team and they just outplayed us."

In the final period Harvey found his favorite target, Nadherny, in the end zone again, this time from five yards out. Harvey's pinpoint accuracy had the Oak Park fans groaning with envy throughout the second half even though the Huskies' Mark Renz put on an outstanding air show himself by completing 10 of 19 for 64 yards.

Afterwards there were the obvious

comparisons to be made by Zemba who has come out on the losing end to both New Trier and Evanston. He hedged, but only slightly. "Today New Trier was better than Evanston. Their line is a little stronger. Their offense is a little better. They just overpowered us off tackle. They may not be as good on defense as Evanston but they're certainly plenty tough."

But who is the number one team in the state?

"Well, I'd say they're the best we've played against," Zemba countered.

Does that mean they're number one? "Yes, I'd say they deserve to be number one."

NTE Suburban League champs

If there remained any doubt in anyone's mind after the New Trier East-Evanston game last week as to who would be the league champion, let those doubts be forever erased. The Indians clinched the title in convincing style this week, as they played probably their finest game of the season offensively.

"We looked pretty good on offense," allows NTE coach Chic Cichowski. "Oak Park scored right off the bat but we came back and scored the next three times we had the ball. I wasn't too worried after that."

"There's no question we're tops in the Suburban League," says the coach. "We've won the championship two years in a row now. I'm pretty tired of hearing how things would have been different if the field had been dry when we beat Evanston. Our greatest strength offensively is our passing game and we were unable to pass at all that game."

Does your team deserve to be called the best in the state, coach? "We have got one heck of a football team. And, a lot of people I know who have seen St. Rita play have not been very impressed with them. They're big, but not very fast. We'll be looking forward to playing them next year (in the playoffs). I just wish we could have playoffs this year."

AFTER COMPILING SOME statistics for the season, Cichowski says "One of the things we were most impressed with is that this team averaged 28 points a game offensively, while allowing only 2.6 points per game to be scored against us."

Some other interesting—and impressive—statistics:

- Not one touchdown pass was scored against the Indian's defensive backfield. Only one touchdown was scored against the regular defensive unit all year.

- Punter Brad Fox in 30 attempts averaged 41 yards per punt. (Last week the leading punter in the Big Ten collegiate conference averaged

42.3 yards.)

- Quarterback Dave Harvey had more playing time on offense than anyone else. He completed 54% of his passes for 916 total yards, and averaged 19 yards per completion.

- Clay Matthews was the leading defensive player for the Indians, averaging 11 tackles per game.

- Andy Binder led the team in rushing with 516 yards for the season. Harvey was second with 407 yards. The Suburban League coaches met Monday night to choose the All-Conference players for 1973. Their selections are as follows:



Cichowski analyses champion team

One suspects that Horatio Alger would have loved Chic Cichowski, and vice-versa. A theme that crops up frequently in conversation with the New Trier East football mentor is that hardwork and dedication are the keys to success, and he has been proving it with the 1973 Suburban League Champion New Trier East Indians.

New Trier has won the gridiron title two years running under the direction of the diligent Cichowski, who recently completed his third year at the helm.

"I'm not honestly sure that I had that much to do with it (winning the championship)," states Cichowski modestly. "In order to be a winner you have to have some talent on the field. I pushed them and I worked them hard and I'm sure they didn't always like it, but I feel that it has to be done."

What factors combined to make the 1973 NTE team probably the best in the state? "Several things," answers the coach. "One of the biggest factors was the attitude of the kids. They came into the season with a great attitude, willing to work, and they really worked hard."

ANOTHER FACTOR: A lot of coaches say this but I really believe it—I really had a great staff working with me. They worked their butts off. Backfield coach Ron Klein (who is also the baseball coach) and line coaches Hank Bangser, Roy May, Jim Wagner and Jim McFadzean all did a great job, as did the coaches on the lower levels.

"Another reason for our success is that the kids are active all year round. Most of them take part in other seasonal sports. Andy Binder and Al Hurley are captains of the baseball team. Dave Harvey, Jeff Nadherny, Tim Hall, Clay Matthews and Roger Casino are all basketball players, and others are on the swimming and track teams."

A quick glance at the statistics is all that is necessary to see why New Trier was so very successful this year: The Indians averaged 28 points a game while allowing a total of only 21 points to be scored against them.

Not one touchdown pass was allowed against the NTE defensive backfield, and only one touchdown was scored on the regular defensive unit all year. Six of the team's eight victories were shutouts, including a 3-0 blanking of powerful Evanston.

YOU CAN'T go wrong with a defense like that. And obviously, it was no accident.

"I'm probably more a defensive coach than I am offense," admits Cichowski. I've always felt that defense comes first. Offense is important but if you want to have a championship team you have to have good defense.


"Our defensive backs, linebackers, ends and interior linemen all did good jobs. It was a tremendous team effort. It goes back to the mental attitude thing—they just wouldn't be beaten."

Cichowski is justifiably proud of his players, most of whom have blossomed under his tutelage. His phone has been buzzing all week with inquiries from college recruiters who are interested in some of the seniors, especially all-conference linebacker Clay Matthews.

"At the beginning of the year we weren't sure who would play linebacker," says the coach. "Matthews strengthened that position greatly. The position is a key to our defense. Clay's ability complemented the overall ability of the team."

"DAVE HARVEY REALLY came a long way as our quarterback. He did everything well—a real good job of ball handling, and a great year throwing. He has a special talent at picking out secondary receivers, and he also is a running threat. He made a big improvement and was a real key to our season offensively. He's by far the best high school quarterback I've seen this year."

"Tim Hall is an underrated player — we had a lot of underrated players. I felt Denison should have been all-conference. But Hall was a starter on offense and defense, and he was the leading scorer for the team with 43 points. He scored two touchdowns and one field goal (to win the Evanston game) and the rest on extra point kicks. He only missed two or three kicks."

Could the (supposed) glory and prestige of college coaching lure Chic Cichowski away from New Trier East?

THE COLLEGES couldn't match me financially as an assistant coach. I would have to take such a cut in pay, probably even as a head coach, that I wouldn't be able to afford it."

To be sure, it is a bit premature to be thinking about football 1974-style, but Cichowski is already aiming his sights in that direction.

"I just don't know about next year. We have only one starter coming back — Mark Gion. It's going to depend on how much the sophomores and juniors mature and grow, and how hard they want to work."

"We're going to have our hands full. If the kids expect to repeat they're going to have to work pretty hard, even harder than this year."



Indians top ratings

New Trier East No. 1

Last August, when New Trier East football coach Gene (Chick) Cichowski sized up prospects for the 1973 season, he sure didn't sound like Bear Bryant.

"We had a bunch of kids with good attitudes," recalled Cichowski, "but we weren't sure of their physical ability. After all, we had only five returning starters. We lost our entire defensive line and our best running backs. We had a lot of holes to fill."

Then Clay Matthews showed up. A transfer from California, the 6-2½, 215-pounder proved to be the kind of athlete who can make things happen — good things, that is.

Like an 8-0 record, a second straight Suburban League championship and the No. 1 ranking in *The Daily News'* poll of Chicago area prep teams.

MATTHEWS wasn't the whole show, of course, but the All-State guard-linebacker carried the hammer for a defensive unit that record six shut-outs and permitted only 21 points.

"Matthews is the best linebacker I've seen in our league since Jim Purnell in 1959," said Evanston coach Murney Lazier.

"Clay can play at any college in the country," said Cichowski. "He has the physical tools and, perhaps most important, he has a great mental at-

titude. He really wants to play professional football. That's a big plus in his favor."

The Indians combined their aggressive defense with overall quickness and a balanced offense to surprise the critics. "I guess we're surprised but we should have known better. These kids are winners. They don't know what it is to lose," Cichowski said.

THE OFFENSE, which averaged 28 points per game, was triggered by All-State quarterback Dave Harvey who rushed for nearly 400 yards and passed for nearly 1,000. Harvey, center Duff Stewart and end Tim Hall, whose dramatic 21-yard field goal beat arch-rival Evanston 3-0 in the season's biggest victory, were the only experienced returnees on the unit.

And tackle John Oberlin, who saw little duty in 1972, developed into the team's best offensive blocker. Two non-let-

termen, 6-3, 187-pound end Jeff Nadherny and slotback Dave Hall, made big contributions.

So did Tim Clark and Andy Binder, who shared the ball-carrying chores that were handled a year ago by all-conference star John Castino.

On defense, cornerbacks Chuck Denison and Brad Fox, who averaged 41 yards per punt, were the only returning starters. But nose-guard Al Hurley, tackle Alex Pitt, safety Roger Castino, end Jim

Hardee and junior tackle Mark Gion (6-1, 220) filled the vacancies.

GION IS THE lone experience returnee for 1974 — the Indians will graduate 25 seniors — so Cichowski has some rebuilding to do. His clubs are 14-1-1 for the last two years.

"My only disappointment is that we were able to play only eight games this season," said Cichowski, referring to an Inter-Suburban Assn. ruling. "The season was too short."

"Are we better than the Catholic League teams or other suburban teams that we're rated ahead of? All I can say is that we'll find out who is best in the state playoff next year. But I really wish that next year was this year."



Pioneer Press All-Star Selections

The Pioneer Papers have selected 25 players to its 1973 All-Area football team including Joe Stewart from Evanston Township High who has been named as the honorary captain. In addition, 24 other players were named to Pioneer's Special Mention team.

Evanston, despite its second place finish in the Suburban League behind New Trier East, led all schools in players on the first team with six.

New Trier East, the Suburban League champion and rated No. 1 in the state in some pools, placed five players on that squad as did Loyola Academy which was just eliminated from the Catholic League playoffs on Sunday.

Deerfield, the Central Suburban League champions, placed only two men on first team but placed four others on the special mention squad. Glenbrook North, runners-up in the CSL, placed the same number on each team.

STEWART WAS A unanimous choice for honorary captain. The young man who had lived in Howard Jones' shadow soon made the fans (and Evanston's opposition) forget Howard ever existed.

Stewart scored 14 touchdowns in eight games and rushed for nearly 1,000 yards. He was so dangerous on punt returns that opposing teams refused to kick in his direction. He was so good in the defensive secondary that teams rarely passed or ran his way.

Running a close second for captain honors was Clay Matthews, New Trier East's godsend who magically appeared in Winnetka his senior year after spending most of his life in California.

Matthews, a solid 6-2, 218-pounder, anchored East's tremendous defense at middle linebacker. Chic Chicowski, the East coach, thinks Matthews is as good a college prospect to surface at East in many years. So does Murney Lazier, the Evanston coach. Lazier called Matthews the best linebacker he's seen in almost 15 years.

STEWART WAS BY no means the only good runner on the North Shore nor was Matthews the only linebacker who could hold his own. In fact, both positions were filled with excellent players.

Paul Moore, from tiny (200 students) Lake Forest Academy, is a bruising 6-3, 220-pounder who compiled some prodigious statistics in two years at LFA.

As a fullback Moore gained over 2,000 yards in two years averaging more than 10 yards per carry. At linebacker Moore made over 100 solo tackles in his junior and senior year.

Moore and Stewart are the only two repeaters on the Pioneer Press All-Area first team.

JIM PHILIP, FROM nearby Lake Forest High School, gained over 1,200 yards for the Scouts and scored 124 points in nine games. Philip carries 181 pounds on his smallish 5-9 frame.

An even smaller runner was Deerfield's Dave Koopman who's only 5-10, 160 pounds. But Koopman was the CSL South Division's leading rusher and scored all three of Deerfield's touchdowns in its 21-14 win over Glenbrook North in the league championship.

At linebacker Matthews has good company in Evanston's Steve Molitor and Glenbrook South's Mark Helmreich.

Helmreich was an all-conference linebacker for the second consecutive year in addition to playing fullback for the Titans. Molitor anchored the Evanston defense which allowed only 16 points all season, lowest in the Suburban League.

The first-team quarterbacking honors went to Dave Harvey who led New Trier East to its second championship in a row. "He's by far the best high school quarterback I've seen this year," says Cichowski.

KICKING HONORS BELONG to Tim Hall who was New Trier's leading scorer this year on the basis of extra points and one field goal. That one field goal won the New Trier-Evanston game and came after Hall had injured his leg. He elected to try for the field goal and his 25-yard kick cleared the cross bar by only a foot. But it was enough. New Trier won the game 3-0.

The All-Area team was picked by Pioneer Press staffers Tom Furlong and Dan Allegretti, Evanston and New Trier Township, Ken Paxson, Glenbrook Township, Terry Covin, Deerfield and Vernon Township, and Stan Zoller who covers Lake Forest and Highland Park.

The teams were picked from personal observation and from coaches' recommendations via the league all-star teams.

Only one junior (Pat Hanson of Loyola) made the first team as compared to four last year. Most of the team will go on to college and many will play football. And, no doubt, some we will be hearing from.







What did it take to earn a spot on The Daily News' all-Chicago area football team for 1973?

The 44-man squad sparkles with versatile, big, gifted athletes who have pulled off miracles on the gridiron this fall and attracted raves from college scouts.

The 10th annual all-Chicago area team features:

- One of the most prolific passers in Illinois prep history in Pat Murray of Lake Zurich, who accounted for nearly 4,000 yards of total offense in the last two years. Or about 2 1/4 miles!
